### Every Child Brings Us God's Smile

Tommy, 10, and his family just moved in the area. Being new, his parents wondered if Tommy would be accepted by the new community. In the last place they lived, it took several years for Tommy to make friends. You see, Tommy was born with Down Syndrome, and he was teased a lot because of his disabilities. Then a few

of his schoolmates really got to know Tommy, and saw how wonderful he truly is, how encouraging he is, and how he brings a smile when he enters a room.

This new community was actually more accepting of Tommy because students there learned about a foundational Catholic teaching of how all humans - born and unborn, persons with disabilities, persons of different races and cultures, young and old, rich and poor - are all God's children. Tommy and his family were happy to see that the Catholic parish really made an effort to teach this, as they truly felt welcomed in this community.

The Church teaches that the foundation of Catholic Social Teaching is the life and dignity of human life - all human life. During this month of October, we are given an opportunity to teach this on so many levels: to our children, youth, and adults. Look at your curriculum to see how you can focus on the life and dignity of the human person. Perhaps include activities that center around this teaching. Look at issues like the unborn, human dignity of persons with disabilities, marriage between a man and a woman

and family life, infertility and contraception, assisted suicide vs. the dignity of suffering and dying, and looking at building a culture of life. In fact, the US Bishops have some wonderful resources regarding these very issues with their 2009 Respect Life Program materials (see <http://www.usccb.org/prolife/programs/rlp/2009/index.shtml>).

Even though Respect Life Sunday was October 4, 2009, it is not too late to teach about life and dignity. You have the whole month of October, and really, there are opportunities throughout the year. We want more parishes to be prepared if someone like Tommy comes to our parishes.

Right now, how would your parish community treat a person like Tommy? Are you prepared or is your parish prepared if someone of a different race or culture or a person with a disability signed up for faith formation?

Let us all create a culture where all God's children are welcomed and included. And let us recognize that every child and every person brings all of us God's smile!

### Reaching for the Rosary in October

It is so natural to return to the prayers one learned as a child during times of difficulty and transition. Over the past few months, I have been reaching for my rosary very often and finding a great deal of comfort and support.

*Rosary Stars*, a new DVD, which features well known Catholic athletes and actors praying the Rosary along with moving testimonies, has just been ordered for the Media Center Library. Check in with Joan Weichering in about ten days to see if you can borrow it for your young people (507-233-5330).

I've been doing a great deal of reading on the Rosary. Of the ten books or so I have on the Rosary, I'd like to make one huge recommendation... If you only read one book on the Rosary in your entire life, let it be, *The Rosary: A Path into Prayer* by Liz Kelly. The book was published in Chicago by Loyola Press in 2004. I have several copies in my office to lend to anyone who is interested. This is a very user friendly, youth friendly resource with lots of testimonies from young people who actually pray the Rosary.

The author, Liz Kelly, is a twenty-something writer who has published both fiction and nonfiction and a jazz singer who has released two CDs. She received her MFA in creative writing from the University of Alaska and currently works for Harvard University. She lives in Watertown, Massachusetts.

Just to give you a taste of it, I've included the following excerpt:

#### Pier Giorgio's Secret Life

Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925) was young, handsome, popular, well educated, and wealthy. He was also remarkably devoted to the Rosary.

Beloved especially among young people and among university students in particular, Blessed Pier Giorgio was an extraordinary young person who had the fervent prayer life of a mystic. As the son of a socially prominent Italian businessman and politician, Pier Giorgio was a member of the Turinese elite. He was as rigorous and ardent about his athletic life as he was about his prayer life: hiking, horseback riding, mountain climbing, skiing, and bicycling were some of his favorite

activities. He often attended the theater and was fond of art, literature, and music. Behind the scenes, however lived a different Pier Giorgio.

His secret life as an extraordinarily generous and humble servant to the poor began to be revealed after his death from polio at age twenty-four. Pier Giorgio most likely contracted the disease when he was visiting the sick. When his funeral was held, the streets of Turin were filled with mourners, many of them, the poor, sick, lonely, and aged that Pier Giorgio had helped throughout his short life. He sacrificed much to help Turin's downtrodden, such as when he took all the money his father had given him at his graduation and gave it to the poor. Even on his deathbed, he offered instruction to his friends and family about how to care for the poor who had come to depend on him. Much to the surprise of even his own family, Pier Giorgio had impacted the lives of thousands of the faceless poor of Turin.

Pier Giorgio's inner life was rich as well. He often spent the night before the tabernacle, kneeling before the Eucharist in profound prayer. He belonged to a nocturnal Eucharistic adoration group and was one of the most devoted members. One of his favorite prayers was the Rosary. He even cultivated plants whose seeds he would use to make the rosaries for his friends. His rosary was always with him, either encircling his hand as he walked to and from church or hiked up mountains, or in his pocket, to be retrieved at any moment. In the final years of his life, Pier Giorgio prayed the full fifteen mysteries daily and was a steadfast promoter of the Rosary, something that did not always draw favorable attention. While he was entirely silent about his help to the poor, he was sometimes criticized for being an exhibitionist with regard to his Rosary devotion. But those who criticized him were often won over in time.

Pier Giorgio's love for the Rosary and the Eucharist was accompanied by a great simplicity of faith in action. He would offer the coat off his back to someone without one; he fed the hungry and housed the homeless. He led a positive, simple, faithful life and this was the measure of his sanctity.
