Planning on Faith this Fall

If you are anything like me, fall signals another opportunity (like New Year's) to look afresh at routines, activities, and habits. Perhaps it is a because there is a crisp breeze in the air and leaves changing colors; or that a whole new cycle of events and activities inevitably begins as August comes to a close. Regardless, it is time to break out the wall calendar, day planner, electronic scheduler, or Google calendar and

start to plan and prioritize.

All sorts of events and activities make it onto our calendars. Work, school, exercise, Sunday Mass, and volunteer activities make up the framework of our days and weeks. What does not make the list immediately is prayer and spiritual practices. At first glance, this makes sense. After all, besides

Mass or a religious education class we teach, we may not have a regularly scheduled spiritual activity. It is easier, we may say, to just commit to praying regularly whenever we can fit it in.

I know all too well, however, that when I do not plan for prayer to fit in my day, it often does not happen. And, naturally, when we are not rooted in prayer, we are not as prepared to care for others in our care. Of course, when someone is sick, we are having a rough day or something wonderful happens, we may remember to say, "Please

Lord, help me" or "Thank you, Jesus." What falls by the wayside, though, is recognizing Saints' Feast days, abstaining from meat or making some other penitential practice on Fridays, and remembering to dedicate time to God.

It may seem that we simply do not have time to fit these practices in. To some extent, this is true. Lay men and women in the world will not necessarily be able to commit to saying the Liturgy of the Hours seven times a day like some men and women religious! As a mother of small (read: rambunctious) children, daily Mass is not always plausible either. So, yes, the sorts of spiritual practices you adopt will depend somewhat on your vocation and particular circumstances.

Yet, we are all called to offer Christ the first fruits of our lives. Just like we should prioritize giving to the Church and those in need above our mocha lattes, we should value fitting our faith into our day above more superfluous activities.

What could the prioritization of faith this fall look like to you? The following are just a few ideas, which may or may

not appeal to you. Feel free to add and adapt as necessary!

• Celebrating Feast days. Take out your parish calendar or consult an <u>online</u>

<u>resource</u> that details Feast days by month.

Mark down Holy Days of Obligation first, and then any other feasts that might have significance to your family or the kids to whom you minister. If you have your

spouse's patron saint on the calendar ahead of time, for example, you might consider going to Mass as a family or having an extra dessert to celebrate on that day.

Daily prayer. Consider your daily routine and what times you would particularly want to turn to God in prayer. Do you want to begin your day with a Morning Offering? Considering adding a reminder to pray to your alarm each morning. Want to say the Angelus? Set a calendar reminder at work so that it pops up on your computer each day at noon.

- Carve out time for visits to Church. You may be
 particularly blessed to have the Exposition of the
 Blessed Sacrament at your parish. Whether you do or
 do not, however, the Lord is always waiting for you in
 the tabernacle. Consider scheduling 15 minutes on
 your way to work to stop in and spend time with
 Jesus. Or, taking a portion of a religious education
 class once a month for your students to make a short
 visit.
- Confession. Depending on how often the Sacrament of Penance is offered, finding time for Confession can be tricky. Think about how often you would like to make it to Confession and put it on your calendar ahead of time. Remind those to whom you minister of the availability of the Sacrament and perhaps even schedule a time when you can all go together.
- The Rosary and other devotionals. Almost everyone has 15 minutes to occasionally turn to the Rosary and ask the Blessed Mother for her assistance. Or, perhaps, another devotion like the Divine Mercy chaplet is more helpful to you. Think about when you can find time to pray; you may surprise yourself! I have friends who pray the Rosary on their commute, on their daily runs and before bed.

Of course, our faith life is more than just an event on a calendar or an item on a to-do list. Yet, taking the time to plan for prayer is one more way that we can honor the Lord by making Him the center of our lives.

Catechetical Sunday Teaching About God's Gift of Forgiveness

The theme for Catechetical Sunday 2014 is **Teaching About God's Gift of Forgiveness**.

orgiveness is one of the great hallmarks of Christianity. Let's look at the Our Father or Lord's Prayer: "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." We ask for God's forgiveness when we sin, but we are challenged to forgive others in the same way. So a good question to ponder: Do we want God to forgive us as we forgive others? Some of those who sinned against us have perhaps hurt us deeply emotionally, physically, and even spiritually. And no matter how hard it is to forgive, we are called to forgive and God will help us every step of the way.

A favorite parable of mine is *The Parable of the Forgiving Father and the Prodigal Son* which teaches how God forgives us, how God truly loves us! We need this story for our times today, where we read and see in the news too much hatred and bitterness, too much violence, and too much animosity. This story and many like it needs to be told to a wide audience to inspire us to forgive like God forgives.

Movies about Forgiveness

The Tale of Despereaux, an award winning book in 2004 made into motion picture in 2008, is yet another story about forgiveness. The USCCB called it a movie that can be "recommended for all." It is a tale of bravery and forgiveness. Here is the trailer:

Stories of Forgiveness

Then there is the story of an Orthodox family from Bosnia during the war in the 1990s. An enemy heavily armed came into their home raped the mother, shot the husband and the uncle, and left the home only to be shot by a sniper. Still alive, the mother dragged his body into the house and through her grieving and sobbing, bandaged his wounds. When he came to, he asked the women incredulously, "Why?" She said, "I am a follower of the One who teaches forgiveness."

This is how Christ forgives, even our enemies. Of course the ultimate story of forgiveness. Jesus forgave from the cross all those responsible for his passion and death. Moreover, Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection transcend time and space; so it was an act of love and forgiveness for us, today.

We need to teach, "I forgive you!"

When my children were younger my son, Andrew, and his best friend, Alek, were playing at a nearby playground. I was working on replacing some worn boards on our front porch that day. Andrew and Alek came back from the playground and Alek was crying. Andrew explained that a boy beat up Alek. So I went to the playground and saw the older boy there and I confronted him. He wore a St. Michael sweatshirt. Since he was Catholic, I used this opportunity to let him know that his action was against our faith and explained to him why (at his age-appropriate level). Then I went back to our house. Fifteen minutes later, he came back to apologize to Alek. Alek responded, "That's okay." Now I realize that this is the American way to say, "I forgive you." However, in my mind, it sends a confusing message. "That's okay" could mean "I give you permission to sin against me again." Yet, it really is not okay. So I taught Alek to say to him, "I forgive you." He did. And to this day, he has never forgotten that lesson.

Forgiveness does not mean the sinner gets off scot free. There needs to be justice, there needs to be reparation for the damage done, and there needs to be reconciliation. Sometimes that does not happen, but when it does, justice and peace are the fruits.

And of course, Penance and Reconciliation is the Sacrament of Forgiveness! Encourage your catechists, parents, students, and all adults to frequent this sacrament to receive God's grace and forgiveness!



Religious Education Safe Environment Compliance Reminders

All Catechists Lists from each parish are due by Tuesday, September 16, 2014. If you do not have all the grades covered by then, send what you have and then send the names of the catechists who are filling those grades as soon as possible. Please report the name, grade(s) taught, and e-mail address. (A form was sent to each parish to verify, change, delete, and/or add -return that corrected/updated form to Margy). Thank you!

Any DRE, youth minister, catechist, adult, helping with youth ministry, or anyone who may be in a ministry with minors is required to be in total compliance with safe environment requirements. This includes VBS volunteers and chaperones for summer events:



The four areas of compliance [a condition of employment or volunteer service] are:

- 1) Have a background check before beginning employment or volunteer service.
- 2) Sign forms A & B of the 2007 diocesan sexual misconduct policy before beginning employment or volunteer service.
- 3) Attend a VIRTUS training session before beginning employment or volunteer service. If there is a serious reason that prevents attendance prior to employment or volunteer service, a grace period of 60 days is allowed, but this only pertains to long term ministries lasting a school or catechetical year.
- 4) Each individual is to complete online training as assigned.

Provide Safe Environment training for children and youth during October or the first week of November at the latest. These lessons need to be taught at the beginning of the catechetical year, rather than later, to ensure our children and youth have the tools they need to be safe. Remember we are doing Lessons 1 and 2 this year. These reports are due back to the diocesan Safe Environment Office by November 11, 2014.

The Opt Out Form is to be provided to parents before the children's training. If parents wish to opt their child out they are to return the Opt Out Form before the lessons take place. If a child is opted out, the parent receives a copy of the lesson plans to able to cover the material with their child at home.

Remember to use only diocesan opt out and reporting forms.

Online training is to be completed within 30 days of being posted to the VIRTUS account. Communicate with your volunteers to complete the online training as soon as possible. It takes approximately 10 minutes (or less) to do the training and answer the question at the end. And thank you for keeping our children and youth safe!
