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The National Directory for Catechesis Those Who Catechize What Does It Say About Catechists

The National Directory for Catechesis (NDC) is a great resource for parishes to understand the role of those who catechize: the pastor, the parish catechetical leader (PCL, formerly called the DRE or CRE), the parents, the catechists, and so on. I will take directly out of the NDC what it says about these various people and their role in catechizing to aid catechetical formation as effective in the parish, in the Area Faith Community:

The apostolic work of the catechist springs from the Sacrament of Baptism through which all believers come to share in the prophetic ministry of Christ and the evangelizing mission of the Church. It is strengthened by the Sacrament of Confirmation. The call to the ministry of catechist is a vocation, an interior call, the voice of the Holy Spirit. Catechists need to be practicing Catholics who participate fully in the communal worship and life of the Church and who have been prepared for their apostolate by appropriate catechetical training. Their commissioning by the Church is a participation in the divine calling to teach as Jesus did. Their commissioning by the Church is a participation in the divine calling to teach as Jesus did. Their personal relationship with Jesus Christ energizes their service to the Church and provides the continuing motivation, vitality, and force of their catechetical activity. Christ invites all catechists to follow him as a teacher of the faith and a witness to the truth of the faith.

Like all the faithful, catechists are called to holiness. Because of their ministry and mission; however, the call to holiness has a particular urgency. The spiritual life of a catechist should be characterized by:

- A love of God Father, Son, and Holy Spirit and of Christ's Church, our Holy Father, and God's holy people
- A coherence and authenticity of life that is characterized by their faithful practice of the faith in a spirit of faith, charity, hope, courage, and joy
- Personal prayer and dedication to the evangelizing mission of the Church
- A missionary zeal by which they are fully convinced of the truth of the Catholic faith and enthusiastically proclaim it
- Active participation in their local parish community, especially by attendance at Sunday Eucharist
- A devotion to Mary, the first disciple and the model of catechists, and to the Most Holy Eucharist, the source of nourishment for catechists

Lay catechists have a special solidarity with those whom they serve. They live in the same world as those they catechize, and share the same demands of living in that world. Their proclamation of the Gospel, their personal testimony, and their living witness to the transcendent values of the Christian life can be particularly effective because they know the ordinary experiences of everyday life so well and are able to incarnate the Gospel in those ordinary circumstances.

Catechists must be attentive to adapt their method of catechesis to the needs of the particular groups they serve. Catechists serve a wide variety of persons, and the message of the Gospel must be proclaimed in such a way that they can understand it, and that it is applied to their life situation. Those who are in need of catechesis include those who do not have the constant presence of a priest; families; adults, young adults, children, and adolescents; those preparing those with special needs; immigrants, migrants, refugees, and people on the move; those in campus ministry programs; Catholic school children; members of movements and associations; those in hospitals and the military; those in prisons. The Church has a serious responsibility to identify

the groups in need of specialized catechesis and to provide training and formation for those who respond to the Holy Spirit's call to be a catechist to these groups.

Catechists are to identify and create suitable conditions which are necessary for the Christian message to be sought, accepted, and more profoundly investigated for each of the various groups they serve. It is clear that, in order to present the Catholic faith in its fullness and in a way that is attractive to each group, those who catechize need preparation and ongoing formation specific to the conditions of those to whom they proclaim the Gospel message. To this end, catechist formation programs cooperatively developed by parishes and dioceses must ensure that catechists receive assistance in developing their knowledge of the faith and the Gospel message as well as the dimension of savoir-faire, of knowing how to transmit the message, so that it is an act of communication. Faith is the result of the initiative of God's grace and the cooperation of human freedom. Catechists should humbly acknowledge, with St. Paul, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God caused the growth."

So, with this excerpt from the National Directory of Catechesis, the NDC, we can see how important the role of the catechist is. We need to form and train them adequately, we need to foster a relationship of collaboration with the parents for those catechists who catechize children and youth, and we need to give them all the support and help they need to be effective evangelizers and catechists.

Catechists can be catalysts for evangelization. We know many families who either send their children/youth to religious education or even Catholic schools, yet they are not to be seen at the Sunday Eucharist. We need to be developing relationships with parents and helping them understand the importance of the Sunday liturgy as well as practicing the faith in the home. Hopefully with a new emphasis on evangelization in our Church today, we can reach out and invite more, and catechists can be instrumental in this mission.

Religious Education Safe Environment Compliance Reminders

Any DRE, youth minister, catechist, adults helping with youth ministry, or anyone who may be in a ministry with minors is required to be in total compliance with safe environment requirements.

Some catechist lists received have included individuals who have not yet completed any diocesan Safe Environment requirements. Please double-check with your local SEC to make sure everyone in your programs is fully up-to-date. The four areas of compliance [a condition of employment or volunteer service] are:

- 1) Have a background check before beginning employment or volunteer service.
- 2) Sign forms A & B of the 2007 diocesan sexual misconduct policy before beginning employment or volunteer service.
- 3) Attend a VIRTUS training session before beginning employment or volunteer service. If there is a serious reason that prevents attendance prior to employment or volunteer service, a grace period of 60 days is allowed, but this only pertains to long term ministries lasting a school or catechetical year.
- 4) Each individual is to complete online training as assigned. Regarding the online training, it is to be completed within 30 days of being posted to the VIRTUS account. Communicate with your volunteers to complete the online training as soon as possible. It takes approximately 10 minutes (or less) to do the training and answer the questions at the end.

MakeUp Sessions for the Students' Training need to be completed by the end of February and turned in by March 1, 2015. The results are to be incorporated on the absentee form. Absentee rates need to be at 5% or below. Student Training forms (Diocesan forms) should all be turned in by now to the Safe Environment Office.

IMPORTANT REMINDER: Please remind your catechists and volunteers to complete their online training. We have a significant number who have not completed this. This needs to be a priority to have this done as soon as possible.
