

# The Catechism of the Catholic Church: Pillar One, Section Two, The Creeds

As we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the promulgation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, I will run a series of articles on the Catechism to help us understand its purpose, its contents, and how it is a go-to resource for all Catholics.

The first pillar of the Catechism of the Catholic Church is the Profession of Faith. And in Section Two, **Introduction**, we look at the summary of statements of belief called the creed. It begins with: "Whoever says 'I believe' says 'I pledge myself to what *we* believe.' Communion in faith needs a common language of faith, normative for all and uniting all in the same confession of faith" (CCC 185).

It explains that summaries of belief, creeds, have been with the Church since the Church's beginning. From the very beginning the Church strived to unify Christians with a creed.

Just look at this creedal statement within St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians: "For I handed on to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared to Cephas, then to the Twelve. After that, he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at once, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. After that he appeared to James, then to all the apostles" (1 Corinthians 15:3-7)I

And since St. Paul received this creed, then it was composed before St. Paul wrote this letter.

It continues to teach about the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed.

In Section Two, **Chapter One**, we learn about God the Father. Our belief in God, our Father is

foundational in our faith. Here, we learn that God is one, "which has its roots in the divine revelation of the Old Covenant...The Christian faith confesses that God is one in nature, substance and essence" (CCC 200).

Even the Jewish Shema prayer, found in Sacred Scripture, proclaims that God is one (CCC 201; Deuteronomy 6:4-9).

God reveals he has a name, making himself known as a personal God to Israel through Moses. He is the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. God proclaims to Moses: "I am Who am." This is a mysterious name, yet reveals that God is. The people of Israel, out of respect to God, do not say this name, but replaces it with the Hebrew, Adonai (in Greek Kyrios, and in English, Lord).

God reveals to Moses that he is gracious and merciful. He is a forgiving God. God because he is revealed as "I am Who I Am," which is thus "He Who Is" means "God is the fullness of Being and of every perfection, without origin and without end" (CCC 213).

With this "He Who Is," God is Truth and God is Love. Regarding Truth, God is Truth itself because God cannot deceive (CCC 215). Regarding Love, God's love is revealed throughout the Old Testament and through the Paschal Mystery of his Son. In fact, St. John reveals that God is love.

It goes on to explain the mystery of the Holy Trinity, that we believe in one God, yet three distinct persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Father is revealed as a person, as a Father to his Son, Jesus, The Father is revealed by the Son (CCC 238-242) and by the Holy Spirit (CCC 243-248). It teaches that it had to define certain terms like substance. person, hypostasis, and so on in order to form the dogma of the Holy Trinity (249-253). The dogma of the Holy Trinity is a central mystery of our faith (CCC 261).

Then it goes into the Almighty quality of God, the Father as omnipotent. He does whatever he pleases, yet is all merciful and caring (CCC 268-271). It describes the Father as Creator. He is the creator of all, visible and invisible. "The existence of God the Creator can be known with certainty through his works, by the light of human reason, even if this knowledge is often obscured and disfigured by error. This is why faith comes to confirm and enlighten reason in the correct understanding of this truth" (CCC 286).

As Creator of heaven and earth, the Father created angels, "purely spiritual creatures [who] have intelligence and will." (CCC 330). And then the Father is also the Creator of the physical cosmos: the stars, the sun, the planets, the earth, water, light, plants, fish, animals, birds, and humans, the summit of God's creation (CCC 343).

It teaches about Man as made in the image of God, who has a body and soul, male and female as complimentarily made for each other, and man and woman in paradise, in perfect harmony and love with God and each other, and harmony with creation. (CCC 355-384) In the next session we learn about the Fall of Man: the fall of angels, the fall of man or original sin, and its consequences (CCC 385-421).

In **Chapter Two**, we begin to learn about the Son, Jesus Christ. The Good News of God sending us his own Son, becoming one of us is a remarkable act of love and mercy for us! As the Catechism points out: "But when the time had fully come, God sent forth his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, to

redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons" (Galatians 4:4-5 and CCC 422).

As we draw closer to the Season of Christmas, this is a good place to stop. We will begin next month to continue to learn about Jesus Christ as we journey through the Catechism of the Catholic Church.

# Religious Education Safe Environment Compliance Reminders

VIRTUS Lessons 5 and 6 were taught in a combined session this fall. The deadline to mail the diocese the completed children's training sheet, the Opt-Out forms, and the children absent listing form for the initial training was November 10. If you have not sent them in, please do so as soon as you can. The deadline to resubmit the absent form noting those attending a make-up session is February 2, 2017.

An absent form was also provided by the diocese for reporting and to track those absent. One copy of the absent form was submitted on the November due date and one copy is kept for planning purposes in preparing a required makeup session opportunity. The form is then resubmitted to the diocese listing the make-up session information by February 2, 2017. Children completely homeschooled are not attending classes so there is no expectation of reporting unless it is a sacramental year and they are attending sessions for these purposes. Catechetical Leaders (PCLs/DREs) can access the Guide for Parents in English or Spanish by logging into the VIRTUS account; go to the Educators tab, then to Lesson Plans, Step 2: Click here to read or print: Teaching Touching Safety.

Catechist Rosters: If you have changes with new catechists and volunteers, please submit those new names and information (position, grade level taught, and e-mail address) to Cindy. Any PCL/DRE, youth minister, catechist, adults helping with youth ministry, or anyone who may be in a ministry with minors is required to be in total compliance with safe environment requirements. ### The essential requirements are met by registering online.

There are three essential requirements which are a condition of beginning employment or beginning volunteer service:

- 1) Complete the required background checks
- 2) Electronically sign receipt of Policy 13 (March 2016) and the Code of Conduct, complete Form B and submit it to your parish
- 3) Attend a VIRTUS training session. If there is a serious reason that prevents attendance prior to

employment or volunteer service, a grace period of 60 days is allowed, but this only pertains to long term ministries lasting a school or catechetical year.

In addition to the Day-One Essential Three requirements, there are also ongoing online trainings assigned. Online training is to be completed within 30 days of being posted to the VIRTUS account.

Annual training for volunteers will be posted in late August each year (it is late this year because we are working with the company to incorporate the signing of the updated Policy 13). Once the training is posted, communicate with your volunteers to complete the online training as soon as possible. Accurate e-mail addresses are essential for the notification process to be effective. Users should also add <a href="mailto:system@virtus.org">system@virtus.org</a> to their contact list so the notice is not processed as spam. Some large businesses will filter out e-mails that are sent in large batches such as the VIRTUS reminder e-mail notices.
