

The Catechism of the Catholic Church: Pillar 1, Section 2 Jesus Christ, The Only Son of God

As we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the promulgation of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, I will run a series of articles on the Catechism to help us understand its purpose, its contents, and how it is a go-to resource for all Catholics.

The first pillar of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* is the Profession of Faith. And we continue with Section Two, **Chapter Two**, as we learn about Jesus, the Christ. It continues with:

"The transmission of the Christian faith consists primarily in proclaiming Jesus Christ in order to lead others to faith in him. From the beginning, the first disciples burned with the desire to proclaim Christ: 'We cannot but speak of what we have seen and heard.' And they invite people of every era to enter into the joy of their communion with Christ" (CCC 425). This proclamation, *kerygma*, is central to our mission as a People of God.

It continues to describe the heart of catechesis as being the person of Christ, quoting from St. John Paul II's *Catechesi Tradendae* (CCC 426, CT 5).

It goes on to say, quoting again from *Catechesi Tradendae* and then, John's Gospel:

In catechesis "Christ, the Incarnate Word and Son of God...is taught - everything else is taught with reference to him - and it is Christ alone who teaches - anyone else teaches to the extent that he is Christ's spokesman, enabling Christ to teach with his lips... Every catechist should be able to apply to himself the mysterious words of Jesus: 'My teaching is not mine, but his who sent me'" (CCC 427, CT 6, John 7:16).

So your catechists are ambassadors of Christ, spokespersons of the Son of God. They represent Jesus, who teaches forgiveness, who teaches us how to love, who saves us from sin and death so that we may receive life everlasting with God and all God's holy ones. Catechists communicate this message through their attitude, actions, and words, just as parents do every day with their children. Both catechists and parents, not only know about Christ, but also know Christ and his words, experience suffering with Christ (CCC 428), and then evangelize and catechize (CCC 429).

In Article 2, it describes the name of "Jesus" as translated from Hebrew as "God saves." In this name is both his identity and mission (CCC 430).

It goes on to describe his title, Christ, which is the Greek for of the Hebrew word, Messiah, meaning the Anointed One. It goes on to say: "Jesus fulfilled the messianic hope of Israel in his threefold office of priest, prophet and king" (CCC 436).

Regarding the title of Jesus as the Son of God, this title is found throughout the Old Testament to describe angels, the Chosen People, the children of Israel, and their kings, but when Peter answered Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am," he juxtaposed two titles, "The Christ, the Son of the living God." And with these titles together, this described a special Sonship to God the Father, and the only one to have this special relationship because in Jesus we find God made man. Of course, this special relationship was revealed through his Baptism, through his Transfiguration, and through his Resurrection (CCC 441-445).

As mentioned last month, God reveals his name to Moses: "I am Who am." The people of Israel, out of respect to God, do not say this name, but replaces it with the Hebrew, *Adonai* (in Greek *Kyrios*, and in English, Lord). Jesus, himself claims this title because indeed the Father and he are one. As we recite our Creed, we believe he is human and divine, and his divinity is found in this title of Lord. It was common for his disciples to call him, Lord (CCC 446-451).

In Article 3, it addresses the teaching of why the Word became flesh (to save us from sin and death), and describes the Incarnation: "The Son of God assumed a human nature in order to accomplish our salvation in it" (CCC 456-463). And it goes on to teach that Jesus is True God and True Man (CCC 464-478).

The Catechism continues this article with "he was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit" by explaining that with the Annunciation, we find the inauguration of the "fullness of time" (CCC 484). The Annunciation brings the angel Gabriel to Mary to announce God's plan for Mary to conceive a son, the eternal Son of God. And it is explained to Mary that this conception is made possible by the Holy Spirit. She, in turn, says, "Yes" to God's will.

The Catechism goes on to teach about the Immaculate Conception that Mary was conceived without sin to prepare her to be the God-bearer. In other words, she was saved at the moment of conception and became "full of grace." She was saved by the Son of God, free from the stain of

original sin, and free from sin her entire life because the Paschal Mystery, God's salvation for us, does transcend time and space even though chronologically this happened afterwards (CCC 490-493).

The Catechism continues with other teachings about Mary including her great "Fiat" -- her yes to God's plan of salvation, her divine motherhood, her virginity, Mary as ever-virgin, and her virginal motherhood as part of God's plan (CCC 494-507).

<u>Presenter</u>: Helen Alvaré, former Director of the USCCB Pro-Life Office and now Professor of Law, Teacher of Family Law, Law and Religion, and Property Law at George Mason University

<u>VIRTUS Lessons 5 and 6</u> were taught in a combined session this fall. A copy of the absent form is to be resubmitted to the diocese listing the make-up session information by February 2, 2017.

Catechist Rosters: If you have changes with new catechists and volunteers, please submit those new names and information (position, grade level taught, and e-mail address) to Cindy, cblickem@dnu.org. **Assigned Volunteer Training:** Annual volunteer training is past due. The good news is 84% of volunteers have completed the training. The not-sogood news is 490 volunteers still need to complete the training. Catechists and program volunteers should NOT be with students if the assigned online training is not complete by this time of the year. The posting has been available over 90 days and the expectation is for it to be completed within 30 days of posting. Catechetical leaders are expected to work closely with their local safe environment coordinators to assist volunteers in completing the training, identifying inactive volunteers to make inactive in the database, and confirming all program volunteers are fully compliant with all safe environment requirements.
