COLLABORATION WITH CATECHISTS: IDEAS FOR PARENTS TO PASS ON THE FAITH

Do you and your catechists ever wonder if there is faith happening in the home of the families you serve? Are they praying together? And, are they even eating meals together? Are they going to church every weekend as a family? Do they have family faith traditions?

If you were to survey the parents, and they could remain anonymous, what would be revealed about their sharing the faith with their children? This may be worthwhile to survey them so you know how to approach your parents.

It does take an extra effort, but it may be worth your time and your catechists' time to set up a meeting with each of the parents to help them to know what the Church expects of them, but along with that, we need listen to their ideas and be prepared to give them some further ideas and resources.

Promises Made

Here is what a bride and groom promise at their wedding: "Will you accept children lovingly from God, and bring

them up according to the law of Christ and his Church?" Each answer: "I will."

Here is what a father and mother promise at the Baptism of their children: "You have asked to have your child baptized. In doing so you are accepting the responsibility of training him (her) in the practice of the faith. It will be your duty to bring him (her) up to keep God's commandments as Christ taught us, by loving God and our neighbor. Do you clearly understand what you are undertaking?"

Parents answer: "We do."

So with these promises made, remind the parents that they are the primary educators of the faith by their actions, by their attitudes, and by their words. And in collaboration with pastors, catechetical leaders, catechists, youth

ministers, these parents can make a real difference in the lives of their children. And it is never too late to start to make a difference.

Meals as Holy Moments as a Family

Family meals are very important for communication, for prayer, for building relationships, and for sharing important Gospel values.

Encourage your parents to have family meals often in order to build communion within the family. The meal prayer can be expanded to other prayers, praying for the needs of others, praying the theme of the liturgical season (Advent, Christmas, Lent, etc.). And conversations about the day and how God has blessed us or sharing struggles so that we can pray for each other – these are important as well.

Teach Us to Pray

Morning prayer, praying during the day, praying in the evening, these are all important to do both individually and together as a family.

Encourage the parents to teach prayers to their children – by memory and by spontaneity. Help them to understand that their prayers teach their children how important their relationship with God is.

Help them to make use of the various wealth of prayers that the Church offers them: Liturgy of the Hours (Divine Office), the Rosary, litanies, the daily examen, spiritual songs, the Divine Mercy prayer, the Prayer for Peace (St. Francis of Assisi), and so on. All of these can be valuable ways to communicate with God and build communion as a family.

Take Them to Church

Remind the families, that is obligatory to attend Sunday (or Saturday evening) Mass every week plus Holy Days are obligatory as well. But help them to understand that not only is it mandated by the Church,



but also it is a great opportunity to connect with the parish community and worship God. And when we are traveling, say on vacation or visiting family, again take them to Mass. And remember, they are not limited to just Sunday Mass and Holy Days.

Encourage them to go to church on Ash Wednesday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Baptismal Days (celebrate these every year), and special feast days. (Do they have a Simon in their family? The Feast of Simon and Jude is on October 28. Their name is not a saint's name? Then choose a patron – like a Confirmation name).

Serve One Another

Serving together as a family can be full of teachable moments. When our children were younger, we would give communion to a few homebound parishioners. And the relationship we made with



those people was truly inspirational. They were wisdom figures to us and like surrogate grandparents to our children. I knew families who served as music ministers together at Mass.

And then outside the parish, families can deliver meals to the homebound together; help an elderly or disabled neighbor with mowing, raking, and shoveling snow; making an immigrant family feel welcome, and so many other ways.

Encourage each family to be active with the parish activities together and with acts of charity in society. These are catechetical moments, teachable moments that can inspire and even change people's lives – both parents and children.

And together with catechists, catechetical leaders, youth ministers, and priests, deacons, and religious, parents can be effective in passing on the faith in such a way that there is staying power with what they pass on.

Parish Visits

Bryan Reising will be on the road again this catechetical year starting in September of 2015 for some parish visits (twice a month). He will visit on the day of your Faith Formation. This will run through May of 2016.

Please contact him to figure out a date that will work for you or he may contact you for that visit as he lines up his schedule. He will not get to all places during the catechetical year, but he would like to get to all regions and most area faith communities. Keep in mind, that Bryan recognizes that this is a very busy day for you. So don't feel you have to give him special treatment. If you have time to meet with him that afternoon, that would be great, but don't feel obligated. He can always meet with you on another day or through a phone call. The main idea for this is to look at what is happening that can benefit other parishes and area faith communities.

What will happen with these visits? The following are some possibilities: an observation of your faith formation during the time of instruction, perhaps an inservice with your catechists, or even a catechetical presentation as a guest catechist for adults, youth, or children.

Keep in mind that this is not an audit, but a visit to observe and be of service. He will have an assessment tool to benefit your catechetical ministry. Early Catholic Family Life (ECFL)

Please be reminded the Diocese of New Ulm has learning materials available to check out to area faith communities offering the Early Catholic Family Life program. Early Catholic Family Life (ECFL) is a wonderful program for parents with children 0-5 years old. ECFL is a structured seven session two-hour class patterned after the highly successful and popular Minnesota ECFE program (Early Childhood Family Education). ECFL consists of a parent-child interaction component, a parent discussion time, and children's learning and play time. This program emphasizes the importance of putting faith at the center of family life at the earliest ages. It is an opportunity to discuss faith education with Catholic parents and an opportunity for parents and preschools to have fun learning more about God together. Religious Education Safe Environment Compliance Reminders

DUE DATES APPROACHING

Thank you for all who sent in their updated VIRTUS rosters checking for catechists and adding new catechist names. If you have not done so, please send them in within the week. Remember to review the list with the Safe Environment Coordinator and then both of you are to sign at the bottom indicating you both agree to the list updates.

Please meet with your Local Safe Environment Coordinator to get any new names reviewed for VIRTUS compliance and for information on getting new volunteers registered in the VIRTUS system. E-mail any new catechist names to skalow@dnu.org indicating if they have been reviewed as being active in the VIRTUS registration system or if you have had them registered as new volunteers.

Send home the Opt-out information to parents the first weeks of class and schedule your Safe Environment training for children and youth for October or no later than November 10, 2015. Remember, lessons are

available to DRE's through your VIRTUS account (Educator tab).

Any catechetical leader, youth minister, catechist, adults helping with youth ministry, or anyone who may be in a ministry with minors is required to be in total compliance with safe environment requirements prior to serving. Please double-check with your local SEC to make sure everyone in your programs is fully up-to-date. Your LSEC should be able to run a parish master list for your convenience as needed. If not have the LSEC contact the diocesan office. Detailed information on Safe Environment components is available on the newly launched and updated diocesan Web site.

Annual volunteer training has been posted on 8/24/15. These should have been completed by 9/24/15. If you have catechists or volunteers that have not completed their online training, they are not in compliance and are not allowed to be unsupervised with minors. For those not in compliance, you may want to use a catechist training opportunity to have a tablet or two (iPad or other) for all those returning volunteers with your program that have not yet completed the online training. It can be done on the larger screen smart phones quite easily as well.

THE NEW DNU.ORG/YOUTH

I am often asked questions about certain events the Diocese of New Ulm is sponsoring for youth. They usually fall into a category I would describe as "basic details:" dates, times, costs, age, etc.

While I love the conversations that usually take place when these questions are called in or e-mailed, sometimes one just needs a quick reference resource to gather information on particular events. DNU.org/youth is set up for this purpose in particular, so I thought it would be good to introduce you to the new DNU.org/youth and it's many functions (one of which being the finding of "basic details").

Basic Details

If you're looking for the "basic details" of events, there are a couple of ways to find them. The first (and most obvious) way to do this is to click on the particular event you would like information for. For instance, if you want to know where the Senior High Youth Rally is going to be held, then click on the "Youth Rallies" image link. Another way to find this information is to scroll through the "Upcoming Youth & Young Adult Events" calendar at the top of the page. Click on the event you are interested in. These are updated fairly regularly.

In addition to basic information, promotional materials can be downloaded from the Web site as well.

Resources

Other than being a resource in and of itself, DNU.org/youth will be adding a "Resources" section which will provide a variety of useful information.

For one, you will be able to use the "Resources" page as a reference to find information on various youth programs (Chosen, YDisciple, LifeTeen, etc.). Secondly, this page will also offer practical articles, activity ideas, and helpful Web sites with similar information.

The Blog

The blog at DNU.org/youth is a new feature which gives you weekly updates from the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry. Right now on the blog, you can find an introduction to the traveling NET team and information on Bishop LeVoir joining us at World Youth Day. There is also some information on why we chose the theme "Unstoppable" for our Senior High Youth Rally.

Feedback

Perhaps the greatest advantage of the new Web site is that the possibilities are virtually (pardon the pun) endless. Online registration is a very real possibility and so is online video conferencing. But it really depends on what the need of the people is.
